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2007 was a very productive year for the men and women of the Tioga County Sheriff's Office. It also marked the end of my first term as your Sheriff. In reflection of the past four years, many changes have occurred in regards to our systems and equipment, while many things have remained stable, such as our manpower levels.


Since taking office in 2004, we have initiated major upgrades to operating systems and have acquired new technologies which have increased our mission effectiveness. We were successful in identifying and obtaining numerous grant funding opportunities which have paid for the majority of these initiatives.

The success of mutual gains negotiating between the Corrections Union, the Sheriff's Deputies Union, and the County Legislature over the last several years has significantly improved the pay structure, making the pay competitive to surrounding agencies. This has stemmed the exit of experienced officers and has kept our staffing numbers relatively constant. This has and will continue to pay huge dividends in the quantity and quality of our work.

Operational statistics have remained steady throughout the last four years and each individual component of the Sheriff's Office has performed in a professional and effective manner. Most notably was the successful multi-agency drug task force "Operation Lightning Strike", which resulted in the arrest of 56 individuals and the confiscation of drugs, money, and firearms.

In keeping with our goal to provide quality services for the least possible cost to the taxpayer, we have successfully ended each fiscal year under budget, while meeting and in most cases exceeding our revenue commitments, which have totaled more than 3.5 million dollars.

As I begin my second term as Tioga County Sheriff I remain committed to providing professional and effective services to the citizens of Tioga County.

The 2007 Sheriff's Office budget increased 9.7% from the previous year. Expenditures came in under budget and revenue earnings finished 3% above estimate.


The budget is separated into three operational portions:


- Sheriff Operations

<u>Jail Operations</u> – supports all functions relative to the care of inmates being housed at the jail and the Work Release Program.


E911 Operations – supports the Emergency E911 Communications Center.






Traditional Sheriff Revenue Streams




Inmate Boarder Revenues

Revenue production within the Jail is directly related to the number of available beds for boarding federal and other county inmates. Bed space is dictated by two major factors:

- **♦** Average local inmate population
- ♦ Average weekend inmate population


In 2007 the average daily population of local inmates was 64, an increase of 10% from 2006. This increase coupled with an 80% increase in the average weekend inmate population, resulted in a reduction of open bed space for revenue boarding inmates.



2007 Inmate boarding fees

- ♦ Federal \$81 per day
- ♦ Parole violators \$40 per day (rate fixed by state law)
- ♦ State Ready inmate \$35 per day (rate fixed by state law)
- ♦ Other county inmate \$80 per day

Identifying and applying for state and federal grant funding continues to be an integral component in our quest to provide cost effective services.

The primary spending focus for these funding opportunities is geared towards replacing or upgrading existing equipment and information technology systems and to subsidize personnel service costs associated with special enforcement initiatives.

Over the last four years the Sheriff's Office has been successful in obtaining numerous grants, all of which require no matching local funding.

New Initiatives and Programs



Sheriff's Office Website Goes On-Line

The official website for the Sheriff's Office was completed and went on-line in December of 2007.

Tiogacountysheriff.com was constructed with the help of InCommand Technologies, a website design and e-business solutions company out of Corning, New York. Visitors to the website can view an array of information about Sheriff operations and special programs. Press releases and special advisories are made available to the public and the media, as well as useful links to public safety related websites and organizations.

Funding for the project was received through a state grant.



Offender Watch

In order to maintain awareness of sex offenders living in your neighborhood we have added a Sex Offender Registry to our website.

Offender Watch's integration into a sheriff's website along with community notification, allows a sheriff to keep his community highly informed on sex offenders within the area.

Offender Watch provides the public tools to search and view sex offender data for their neighborhood, in a form they can readily use, such as geographic risk assessment and community email notifications.

Integrated Email Alerts allow citizens the ability to register for automatic email notifications anytime a sex offender registers an address within a 1 mile radius of their home.

Reverse 911

Hyper-Reach® (Reverse 911) is a complete emergency notification and voice broadcasting system allowing emergency communications personnel and first responders to deliver a message to the population fast, effectively and affordably.

The system is intended to be used in emergency situations where the broadcasting of emergency instructions to residents can be accomplished quickly and directly to a residents phone; cell phone, TTY, or e-mail. Instructions about evacuations; boil water warnings, as well as other public health information can be issued quickly and effectively.

Funding for this project came from state grants acquired by the Sheriff's Office; Fire Coordinator and the Emergency Management Office.



The Sheriff's Office continues to be an active partner with the NYS Child Passenger Safety Program.

Through a grant from the NYS Governor's Traffic Safety Council, 40 child safety seats were purchased. Tioga County residents can make a reservation to have their child safety seat inspected as well as instructed on the proper method for installing a child safety seat. During these inspections, seats which are deemed unsafe or appear on a factory recall list will be replaced free of charge while quantities last.

The Sheriff's Office has been participating in the program since 1999.

Coming in 2008



Statistics show that 34 percent of parents in the United States do not know their child's exact height, weight and eye color. And, when a child is reported missing, time can be the greatest adversary. Possessing up-to-date photographs and detailed information about a child can prove to be important proactive measures that can greatly assist local law enforcement officials to quickly respond to a child's disappearance.

Using equipment that contains the latest digital fingerprinting technology and high resolution photography capabilities, the Tioga County Sheriff's Office will be able to produce a SAFE CHILD card for parents and guardians.

The cards contain a child's name, biographical information (date of birth, gender, height, weight, hair color, eye color, etc.), and a fingerprint image of both index fingers.

The card can be made in less than two minutes and can be easily carried in a wallet or pocketbook.

In addition to being able to quickly provide important details to police agencies investigating child disappearances, the New York State SAFE CHILD Card will serve as an important tool when used in conjunction with the New York State AMBER Alert and Missing Child Alert programs. These cards will allow essential missing child information to be electronically disseminated, statewide if necessary, within minutes and dramatically increase the possibility of bringing a missing child home unharmed.

This program is funded by the New York State Division of Justice Services and the Missing and Exploited Children Clearinghouse.

TraCS (Traffic and Criminal Software) is a mobile computer technology that enables law enforcement to electronically issue tickets and accident reports. The hardware required to run the TraCS application in a police vehicle includes an in-car computer, a plain paper printer and a 2D barcode scanner (TraCS equipment).

With this equipment, Sheriff's patrols will be able to electronically streamline tickets and accident data from their patrol vehicle to DMV and on to the local courts.

NYS DCJS is funding the costs of equipment and supplies.

The H.H.S building houses the Department of Social Services; Public Health Department; Mental Hygiene Department, and; Tioga Employment Center.


The post is manned during normal business hours and is outfitted with a walk through metal detector and an X-Ray machine for checking hand baggage, parcels, and other containers.


Personnel funding for this post is reimbursed by New York State.






New Law Enforcement Too/

A new piece of equipment was deployed this year to help detect unlicensed, suspended, and revoked drivers. A License Plate Scanner was acquired in late fall of 2006 from the NYS Division of Criminal Justice Services. The equipment was installed on one of our patrol vehicles and went into full operation in January of 2007. License Plate Reading (LPR) Technology uses specialized cameras and computers to quickly capture large numbers of photographs of license plates, convert them to text, and compare them quickly to a DMV database which is uploaded daily. Mobile license plate reading systems are designed to allow officers to patrol at normal speeds while the system reads every license plate they come in contact with and alerts them if there is a match to a "hot list" meaning that the registration is suspended or revoked or that the car is stolen or is being sought for other reasons.


When a target plate is located the Deputy in the vehicle is notified with a message that is specific to the plate. The identification of stolen vehicles, stolen license plates, and wanted and missing persons has been the primary focus of the use of this equipment. But, in addition to it being used for traffic enforcement, this equipment is also capable of being a useful tool when an AMBER Alert is issued. Plate information related to the AMBER Alert is sent statewide and entered into the license plate readers. Instantaneously, the officer will be alerted if the plate has been detected by the license plate reader which provides date, time, and location. If not detected, the license plate reader provides that extra set of eyes when observing traffic during the AMBER Alert.







2007 Headline Cases

Apalachin Pharmacy Robbery

Investigators arrested a 24 year old Apalachin man on June 26th, and charged him for the June 11th armed robbery of a pharmacy located on Rt 434 in Apalachin.

The suspect is accused of entering the pharmacy brandishing a handgun and demanding methadone from the pharmacist. He then fled the scene on foot with the methadone. No one was injured.

Arsonist are Apprehended

Two Waverly, N.Y. residents were arrested in connection with a string of fires that occurred in the Town of Barton during the month of December 2007.

The two men, who are brothers, were charged with four counts of arson in the third degree. All counts are class C felonies, and were levied following an extensive investigation of four fires which destroyed a log cabin, two vacant buildings, and a vacant house. Both suspects were remanded to jail.

Meth Lab Busted

A 47 year old Spencer, New York man is charged with second degree criminal possession of a controlled substance after investigators executed a search warrant at his residence on Dawson Hill Road, in the Town of Spencer.

Investigators recovered meth, marihuana, several firearms, and other contraband from the residence.

Bus Garage Burglary Solved

Four Owego Free Academy students were arrested on Burglary and Criminal Mischief charges for breaking into the School Bus Garage and damaging buses.

Damage estimates range between \$17,000 and \$20,000.

Emergency 911 Communications Center

The Emergency E911 Center is the sole PSAP (Public Safety Answering Point) for all of Tioga County and serves as the communications hub for all emergency services.

The center has earned and currently holds an accreditation through the New York State Sheriff's Association.



Corrections Division

The Corrections Division is the largest component of the Sheriff's Office. In New York State each county Sheriff is mandated by law to operate a Jail. Operations continue around the clock each day of the year. All operations are strictly governed and inspected by the New York State Commission of Corrections.

The Tioga County jail is a maximum security facility authorized to hold 104 inmates. The facility houses both male and female inmates age 16 or older. In addition to housing local prisoners the Jail is authorized to house inmates from other counties as well as Federal Inmates, Illegal Aliens, NYS Parole Violators, Military Prisoners, and civil confinement prisoners.






In 2007 the number of inmates processed during the year was 770. This represents a decrease of 23% compared to 2006.


Of the 770 inmates processed, 605 were committed by courts within Tioga County, accounting for 79% of the jail's population. This represents a 22.5% increase over 2006.


The 2007 average daily inmate population was 81, a decrease of 8% compared to 2006.




















Inmate Medical

In cooperation with the Owego-Apalachin Central School District (OACSD), the education program at the Jail continues to provide General Equivalency Diploma instruction for both juveniles and adults. The program is directed by Tom Silvanic, of the OACSD and is funded by New York State through the OASD Incarcerated Youth Program. Inmate Commissary revenues have also subsidized the purchase of instructional materials and equipment.


During the year a total of 25 inmates enrolled in the juvenile GED program, and 4 inmates enrolled in the Adult GED program.

Two juvenile GED examinations were administered, with 5 inmates passing and earning their diploma.

4 inmates took the adult GED examination, with 1 inmate successfully earning his diploma.

A variety of other classes are held for inmates and include such topics as

- Life Skills
- o Pre-Employment

Law Library

Each county jail in New York State is required to provide inmates with ready access to legal books and related material. The Jail currently maintains an extensive Law Library with nearly 1,000 volumes of law books and legal briefs. Annually, many of these books require updating at a cost of between \$6,000 and \$10,000. These costs continue to be offset by utilizing revenue earned from the inmates' commissary. In 2007, \$11,132 was spent updating the library.



Religious Services

Religious services are provided by a variety of clergy and private citizens who are involved in their respective ministries. Religious preferences vary widely, and if the inmates' preference is a legitimately recognized faith, arrangements are normally made to provide those services.

Local churches and institutional ministries, such as the Golden Key Ministries visit the facility regularly to minister and counsel those inmates who show an interest in attending.

These services and counseling sessions are provided once a week. In 2007 the following ministries provided spiritual counseling and services to the inmate population:

Inmate Commissary

Jails and Prisons in New York State are permitted to operate an Inmate Commissary, in which inmates may purchase hygiene products, snack foods, soup, coffee, and candy. Pricing for these items are fixed by the facility and allow for the facility to earn a modest profit. Currently, the Sheriff's Office contracts with Swanson, Inc., a Commissary Company to provide goods and services. Once a week inmates who have money in their jail account are allowed to order from a list of items. These items are ordered electronically and delivered weekly.

In 2007 the program generated \$9,027 in revenue. \$6,363 was utilized to defray operating costs directly related to the inmates such as: recreational equipment; Law Library updates; Education supplies; hygiene products, and; various office expenses.

Weekend Work Detail

(Alternatives to Incarceration Program)

The Alternatives to Incarceration (ATI) Program has been operating in Tioga County since 1986 and provides the criminal courts with a sentencing alternative through the use of community service. In lieu of being sentenced to confinement in jail, non-violent offenders are required to perform community service work. In its infancy the program was also an effective tool in mitigating jail overcrowding.

An integral part of the ATI is the Weekend Work Program which is administered jointly by the Probation Department and the Sheriff's Office. Eligible offenders are identified by the Probation Department and are recommended to the Courts. The Courts sentence the offender to the program for a predetermined amount of time. Once in the program, the offenders report to the Sheriff's Office each Saturday and Sunday to perform their community service work.

Corrections Officer Roy Schriener oversees all work projects and supervises the details. All work performed is for non-profit organizations, local government, and community based volunteer organizations. The work sites and jobs are planned and approved by Sheriff's Office staff.

Under the NYS Constitution, each Sheriff's Office must operate a Civil Office. The Sheriff is a designated enforcement officer of the Supreme Court of New York and is responsible for enforcing lower court mandates.

The Civil Office is responsible for receiving, docketing, and serving civil processes issued by courts within and outside of New York and executing appropriate proofs of service. Their responsibility includes executing court orders, including warrants of eviction, writs of assistance, civil arrest warrants, orders of seizure, orders of attachment, and orders directing the conveyance of real property.

The Civil Office enforces judgments through enforcement of Income and Property Executions; directing the garnishment of wages; Delivery of real property and the sale of real property at public Sheriff's sales. The proceeds of these enforcement procedures are collected and disbursed to the judgment creditors on a monthly basis. Sheriff's fees received for the service and enforcement of civil process and mandates are collected pursuant to law and remitted to the County Treasurer.

Pistol Permits


The Sheriff's Office is responsible for processing and managing all Tioga County Pistol Permits, Gun Dealer, and Gun Smith Licenses. The issuing authority for all permits and gun licenses is Tioga County Judge Vincent Sgueglia.

The Sheriff's Office supports Judge Sgueglia by performing all administrative duties and background investigations. The Sheriff has authority to issue an official recommendation for granting or denying a license or a permit. To help defray some of the operating costs in performing these duties, the Sheriff's Office is permitted to charge a predetermined fee for each type of transaction.

Sheriff Photo Identifications

The Records Office processes Sheriff's photo identification cards. Identification cards are processed upon request for the public.

The ID's are considered valid proof of identity for air line travel and other security purposes.

The fee for a regular ID card is \$10 and \$5 for seniors. During the year the office processed 193 identification cards and earned \$1,890 in revenue.

Freedom of Information Requests

Another important facet of the Records Office is performing records checks for a variety of private and agencies. Routinely, government background checks on individuals are agencies requested such by as: Department of Social Services—for adoptions; child placements; foster care; Hotline investigations; U.S. Military-Security clearances for military and nonmilitary personnel. Insurance Companies and; Private Attorneys and Investigative firms.

Along with the records checks for background purposes, the Records Office performs inquiries for any records relating to Freedom of Information requests made by the public.

In 2007, the Records Office processed more than 870 requests.

Training

Training is a vital component of the Sheriff's Office mission. With changing trends, expectations, and responsibilities the need to teach new techniques and provide updated information is critical to the safety of the officers as well as the success of the Sheriff's Office.

During the year, Sheriff's personnel attended both "in-house" training such as Firearms Qualifications, Pepper Spray training, and Policy and Procedure reviews, as well as mandated and elective training.

Special Programs & Community Outreach

NYS Sheriff's Summer Camp Iroquois

The Summer Camp Program, founded in 1977, was established by the Sheriffs in order to aid and enhance the development of the state's youth. Each year, as many as 10 children from Tioga County are selected to participate in the program, with all expenses being paid by the Sheriff's Association. The children are selected with the help and input of area school officials and youth advocates who identify eligible children who they believe will benefit most from the experience.

The program is designed to foster a stronger relationship between the children and law enforcement and to give children, who ordinarily would not have the opportunity, a chance for a summer camp experience.

Neighborhood Watch
