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


The Tioga County Sheriff's Office is a full service law enforcement agency serving the communities that make up Tioga County, New York. The services provided by your Sheriffs' Office include the operation of a 104-bed maximum security jail; Operation of an Emergency 911 Communications Center which serves as the sole emergency services answering point for the county; Operation of a Civil Office which enforces judicial judgments, forfeitures and process service; Operation of a Records Office which manages official documents and Pistol Permits, and; Operation of traditional Law Enforcement which patrols the nine towns and five villages covering 524 square miles of jurisdiction.

With a staff of 82 sworn full time officers; 19 full time civilian, and 17 part time employees, the Sheriffs' Office is committed to providing the quality public safety services at the least possible costs to the residents of Tioga County.

This annual report provides insight into the activities of the men and women of your Sheriffs' Office during the year. As always, I encourage you to visit our official website TiogaCountySheriff.com and to take advantage of the information and special programs we offer, such as; Child Safety Seat Program; Operation Safe Child; Family WatchDog; Sheriffs Summer Camp, and; Neighborhood Watch.


The Sheriffs' Office overall budget is made up of three component budgets which relate to specific operations within the agency:




The 2008 budget increased by 5.6% from the previous year. The lion's share of the increase was related to contractual agreements in personnel services.


Several revenue streams, along with other funding sources help defray costs to the taxpayer. In 2008, slightly more than 18% of the total budget was subsidized.



Grants

Identifying and applying for state and federal grant funding continues to be a priority and is an important component in meeting our goal of providing cost effective services.

The primary spending focus for these funding opportunities is geared towards replacing or upgrading existing equipment and subsidizing personnel service costs associated with special enforcement initiatives.

The Sheriffs' Office was awarded the following grants in 2008, totaling \$86,300.

NYS STEP Grant (\$19,800)

Awarded by the Governors Traffic Safety Council, this grant provides funds to support "Special Traffic Enforcement" where extra patrols are deployed to specifically enforce laws against aggressive driving and to develop enforcement countermeasures to reduce crashes, injuries and fatalities.

NYS BUNY Grant (\$6,000)

Awarded by the Governors Traffic Safety Council, the "Buckle Up NY" grant provides funding to participate in the statewide seat belt enforcement wave and for expanded efforts aimed at increasing seat belt use.

Child Passenger Safety Seat Program <u>Grant (\$6,500)</u>

Awarded by the Governors Traffic Safety Council, this grant provides funds to promote the proper use of child passenger safety seats and to provide free safety seats to the public when eligible.

Homeland Security Grant (\$54,000)

Awarded by the NYS Dept of Homeland Security, this grant funded the purchase of communications equipment; emergency response equipment, and; personnel costs for emergency response training.

Sheriff's Office Website

The official website for the Sheriff's Office <u>Tiogacountysheriff.com</u> provides visitors an array of information about Sheriff operations and special programs. Press releases and special advisories are made available to the public, as well as useful links to other public safety related websites and organizations.





The Sheriff's Office continues to be an active partner with the NYS Child Passenger Safety Program. Tioga County residents can make a reservation to have their child safety seat inspected as well as instructed on the proper method for installing a child safety seat. During these inspections, seats which are deemed unsafe or appear on a factory recall list will be replaced free of charge.

Operation Safe Child

Using equipment that contains the latest digital fingerprinting technology and high resolution photography capabilities, the Tioga County Sheriff's Office provides SAFE CHILD cards for parents and guardians.

The cards contain a child's name, biographical information and a fingerprint image of both index fingers.

In the event a child becomes missing, the Safe Child card will quickly provide important details to law enforcement. The card will allow essential missing child information to be electronically disseminated statewide if necessary, within minutes and will dramatically increase the possibility of locating the missing child.

Reverse 911

Hyper-Reach® (Reverse 911) is a complete emergency notification and voice broadcasting system allowing emergency communications personnel and first responders to deliver a message to the population fast, effectively and affordably.

Law Enforcement

Road Patrol Division

The Road Patrol Division is the primary law enforcement component of the Sheriff's Office. It is staffed by 27 officers.

Their jurisdiction includes all of Tioga County, which covers 524 sq miles with 1,089 miles of highway.

Patrol deputies also provide on-site security at the Health and Human Services Building and money escorts for several county government departments.

Criminal Investigation Division

The Criminal Investigation Division (CID) is staffed by 6 Investigators who have many years of experience in law enforcement and are specially trained to conduct criminal investigations of serious crimes.

The center is staffed with 13 E911 Dispatchers and operates around the clock each day of the year.



Corrections

Corrections Division (Jail)

The Corrections Division is the largest component of the Sheriff's Office. It is staffed by 45 full time and 13 part time officers and operates around the clock year long.

The jail is a maximum security facility authorized to hold 104 inmates. Sentenced and non-sentenced male and female prisoners age 16 or older are permitted to be confined in the facility. In addition to housing local prisoners the Jail is authorized and frequently houses inmates from other counties as well as Federal Inmates, Illegal Aliens, NYS Parole Violators, Military Prisoners, and civil confinement prisoners.

The facility operates within the statutory guidelines of the NYS Commission of Corrections.




In 2008, a total number of 742 inmates were processed, decreasing 4% from 2007.


Of the 742 inmates processed, 579 were committed by courts within Tioga County, accounting for 78% of the jail's population. This represents a 1% decrease from 2007.


The average daily inmate population was 79, which is 2.5 % lower than 2007.



























Inmate Educational Services

In cooperation with the Owego-Apalachin Central School District (OACSD), the education program at the Jail continues to provide General Equivalency Diploma instruction for both juveniles and adults. The program is directed by Tom Silvanic, of the OACSD and is funded by New York State through the OASD Incarcerated Youth Program.

During the year a total of 16 inmates enrolled in the juvenile GED program, and 12 inmates enrolled in the Adult GED program.

Three juvenile GED examinations were administered, with one inmate passing and earning a diploma.

Of the twelve adult inmates tested, eight passed and earned their diplomas.



Weekend Work Detail

(Alternatives to Incarceration Program)

The Alternatives to Incarceration (ATI) Program has been operating in Tioga County since 1986 and provides the criminal courts with a sentencing alternative through the use of community service.

An important part of the ATI is the Weekend Work Program which is administered jointly by the Probation Department and the Sheriff's Office. Eligible offenders are identified by the Probation Department and are recommended to the Courts. The Courts sentence the offender to the program for a predetermined amount of time. Once in the program, the offenders report to the Sheriff's Office each Saturday and Sunday to perform their community service work.

Corrections Officer Roy Schriener oversees all work projects and supervises the details. All work performed is for non-profit organizations, local government, and community based volunteer organizations. The work sites and jobs are planned and approved by Sheriff's Office staff.

Civil Office

Under the NYS Constitution, each Sheriff's Office must operate a Civil Office. The Sheriff is a designated enforcement officer of the Supreme Court of New York and is responsible for enforcing lower court mandates.

The Civil Office is responsible for receiving, docketing, and serving civil processes issued by courts within and outside of New York and executing appropriate proofs of service. Their responsibility includes executing court orders, including warrants of eviction, writs of assistance, civil arrest warrants, orders of seizure, orders of attachment, and orders directing the conveyance of real property.

The Civil Office enforces judgments through enforcement of Income and Property Executions; directing the garnishment of wages; Delivery of real property and the sale of real property at public Sheriff's sales. The proceeds of these enforcement procedures are collected and disbursed to the judgment creditors on a monthly basis. Sheriff's fees received for the service and enforcement of civil process and mandates are collected pursuant to law and remitted to the County Treasurer.

The office is staffed by a Civil Manager and a Law Clerk and is in operation during the daytime hours, Monday through Friday. Two part-time Deputy Sheriffs are assigned to provide personal service of processes.

Records Office

The Records office operates Monday through Friday during the day and is staffed by two clerical workers. The office is responsible for managing all legal documents generated at the Sheriffs' Office and performs other duties such as:

- **Processing of Pistol Permits**
- **4** Official and public photo identifications
- **↓** Freedom of Information Requests
- **↓** Dissemination of official reports and files
- **♣** Special background queries

Sheriff Photo Identifications

The Records Office processes Sheriffs' photo identification cards. Identification cards are processed upon request for the public.

The ID's are considered valid proof of identity for air line travel and other security purposes.

The fee for a regular ID card is \$10 and \$5 for seniors. During the year the office processed 147 identification cards and earned \$1,445 in revenue.

Freedom of Information Requests

Routinely, background checks on individuals are requested by such agencies as: Department of Social Services—for adoptions; child placements; foster care; Hotline investigations; U.S. Military—Security clearances for military and non-military personnel. Insurance Companies and; Private Attorneys and Investigative firms.

Along with the records checks for background purposes, the Records Office performs inquiries for any records relating to Freedom of Information requests made by the public.

In 2008, the Records Office processed more than 825 requests.

Pistol Permits

The Sheriff's Office is responsible for processing and managing all Tioga County Pistol Permits, Gun Dealer, and Gun Smith Licenses. The issuing authority for all permits and gun licenses is Tioga County Judge Vincent Sgueglia.

The Sheriff's Office supports Judge Sgueglia by performing all administrative duties and background investigations. The Sheriff has authority to issue an official recommendation for granting or denying a license or a permit. To help defray some of the operating costs in performing these duties, the Sheriff's Office is permitted to charge a predetermined fee for each type of transaction.

Training

Training is a vital component of the Sheriff's Office mission. With changing trends, expectations, and responsibilities the need to teach new techniques and provide updated information is critical to the safety of the officers as well as the success of the Sheriff's Office.

During the year, Sheriff's personnel attended both "in-house" training such as Firearms Qualifications, Pepper Spray training, and Policy and Procedure reviews, as well as mandated and elective training.

NYS Sheriff's Summer Camp Iroquois

The Summer Camp Program, founded in 1977, was established by the Sheriffs to aid and enhance the development of the state's youth. Each year, as many as 10 children from Tioga County are selected to participate in the program, with all expenses being paid by the Sheriff's Association. The children are selected with the help and input of area school officials and youth advocates who identify eligible children who they believe will benefit most from the experience.

The program is designed to foster a stronger relationship between the children and law enforcement and to give children, who ordinarily would not have the opportunity, a chance for a summer camp experience.

Located on the shores of Keuka Lake (Yates County), outdoor learning activities, with professional instruction, are the cornerstone of the camp's recreational program. Team sports are also emphasized as a vehicle to reach comradeship and discipline.

Sheriffs' Offices from across the state volunteer Deputy Sheriffs to supplement the professional staff. The deputies spend a great deal of time with the kids, with many of them conducting demonstrations in the fields of archery, boating, water safety, and police dog exercise, to mention only a few.

Deputy Shelly Bogart has coordinated Tioga County's effort for the last several years.
